Happiness or holiness?



Ministry or manipulation?

A happiness goal leads to manipulation.

A holiness goal leads to ministry.

When holiness is our goal, we honor the other person as made in God's image and growing into His likeness.

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Attitudes of Honor

- You belong to God
- You are made in God's image
- I give without expecting a return
- I want you to be successful
- God is using you to make me like Him
- I'll love you even if you don't respond with love

Attitudes of Manipulation

- You exist to serve me
- You are an object
- I give to get what I want from you
- I need you to make me happy
- You're the problem
- I'll love you as long as it "works" (i.e. changes you)

A happy marriage or a holy one

Which one is the highest priority to you?

"Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

If you had to choose one...

Which one would be more important to you, happiness or holiness?

If your goal is happiness, you will never be fully happy.

If your goal is holiness, you may well achieve both.

The pursuit of happiness

If your goal is happiness, your method of achieving it will be selfishness.

If your goal is holiness, your method of achieving it will be sanctification.



What was wrong?

My GOAL was happiness instead of ministry to Alan.

My ANGER stemmed from him not fulfilling my goal.

I was seeking to be ministered unto, not to minister.

If your goal is happiness...

- Your contentment will rise and fall on your spouse's behavior.
- When your spouse does not please you, you will seek to manipulate him or her.
- You will swing from apathy to resentment, anger, disillusionment or depression.
- You may find yourself thinking, "If only he/she would _____, I would be happy."
- You will approach conflict self-protectively.

If your goal is holiness...

- •You will rely on Christ as the rock-solid foundation of your happiness, lovability and worth
- You will approach conflicts with a primary desire "not to be ministered unto, but to minister."
- You will respond to conflicts lovingly and respectfully, whether or not you feel loved or respected.
- You will bring to your home an atmosphere of heaven.
