<u>Favorite Basic Garden Tools for the Home Grower and Market Gardener</u>. All of the websites mentioned below are also good resources for other tools and information.

- Collinear Hoe. A light weight hoe for cultivation of just germinated weed seeds. Also good for precision cultivation next to plants and under leaves. www.johnnyseeds.com
- Stirrup Hoe. A heavier duty hoe that works with reciprocal action, allowing you to be productive with both "push" and "pull" motions. Comes with 3.25", 5" and 7" size blades. If you can only afford one, I would recommend the 5 inch blade. If you can only afford either a stirrup hoe or a collinear hoe, get the stirrup hoe. www.johnnyseeds.com;

- Spading/Digging Fork. A strong fork with a lifetime warrantee. Used for breaking up hard, compacted ground in bed preparation and for harvesting root crops. www.johnnyseeds.com

- 3-Tooth Cultivator. A tool that we use primarily for breaking up surface soil clods and clumps after having used the spading fork or broadfork in bed preparation. Also useful for working compost and soil amendments into the top inch or two of soil. www.johnnyseeds.com
- Bed Preparation Rake. We use this rake to give the finishing touch to our beds, after breaking up clods and working in amendments with the 3-tooth cultivator. A standard garden rake can be used, but if at all possible, this rake is much superior (it is lighter, the width of the 30" bed, and the angle of the tines can be adjusted). www.johnnyseeds.com

Favorite Advanced Garden Tools for more serious Home Growers and Market Gardeners

- Broadfork. After having made a bed with a loose soil structure (usually the result of adding plenty of organic matter) and grown a crop, we prepare the bed for the next planting by using the broadfork to loosen the soil again. It basically performs the function of the spading fork, except that it reaches across the whole bed, speeding up the process considerably. To easily work a 30" bed in one pass you need to get a broadfork that is at least 20" wide, but also keep in mind, the wider the broakfork, the more difficult it is to sink into the soil (this also depends on soil structure/condition). www.johnnyseeds.com; www.valleyoaktool.com; www.valleyoaktool.com;
- Wheelhoe. The wheelhoe is basically a stirrup hoe behind a wheel. Numerous additional
 attachments are available as well. We most often use it for cultivating aisles and occasionally
 for cultivating between crops in a bed. It makes cultivating with a hand held hoe seem
