
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Once to every man and nation, comes the moment to decide,





From 1524 lived as a fugitive, modern day James Bond outwitting spies across Europe

Travelled to Hamburg, then had to escape and headed to Worms where he was able to finish his translation of the New Testament.

From the time he left England in May, 1524 he had finished the NT sometime in 1525

Bishop of London bought 6000 copies and burned them on the steps of St Paul's Cathedral on 11th February, 1526 - attended by 36 Bishops, Abbots and Friars

Positive Outcome:

- Tyndale out of debt
- Enraged others who saw this profligate waste of Bible
- Enabled a better quality version to be printed

Last place he lived was Antwerp with Thomas Poyntz

Befriended by Henry Philips - judas like character

Taken as prisoner to Vilvoorde Castle, 18 miles away

Whilst a prisoner an attempted reconciliation between the King and Tyndale took place. Royal court wanted him on their side

Despite promises he would not return unless the King sanctioned a Bible in the English language

April 24th, 1655 - Duke of Savoy

- Estimated 2000 killed

"Little children were torn from the arms of their mothers, and dashed against the rocks; or, more horrible still, they were held betwixt two soldiers, who, unmoved by their piteous cries and the sight of their quivering limbs, tore them up into two halves. Their bodies were then thrown on the highways and the fields. Sick persons and old people, men and women, were burned alive in their own houses;...

"...some were hacked in pieces; some were bound up in the form of a ball, and precipitated over the rocks or rolled down the mountains ... Some were slowly dismembered, and fire applied to the wounds to staunch the bleeding and prolong their sufferings; some were flayed alive; some roasted alive; others were disembowelled; some were horribly and shamefully mutilated..."

- Worship services in secret; Assemblies of the Desert
- Both parents died in prison
- Brother taken to prison and sentenced to death
- 19 years old, married Matthieu Serre
- Husband arrested and sent to prison for 20 years















- From 1730 at the age of 18 until 1768 she remained in this prison

- At age 56 she moved back to the family house and lived about 8 years

- Today her house is a museum and a testament to her faith and fortitude



- George Wishart: Scotlands Forgotten Reformer
- Martyred at just 33 years old
- Only had 2 years of active, public ministry

- Cardinal Beaton (St Andrews) made it his mission to capture and kill him

- Chased him all over Scotland and failed on several occasions to bring him in



- Finally with 500 men he apprehended him

- Brought to St Andrews castle and burned to death outside it



- Watching him die was a young man named John Knox

- He was his 'bodyguard' carrying a two handed sword as he protected him

- At final capture he also wanted to go with him but was told that 'one is sufficient for sacrifice'

- Instead he continued the reformation in Scotland and established Protestantism (Presbyterianism) as the main faith



- Why did God preserve the life of one reformer (John Knox) and not the other (George Wishart)?

- Why was one allowed to live a long life into his 70's and the other died at just 33?

We must understand these stories in the context of the Great Controversy between Christ and Satan

And you're eating it out of a soap dish or a tin can. And here comes Miss Stark up behind us, one of our teachers. "Mary Taylor, do not slouch over your food while you are eating. Do not talk while you have food in your mouth. And there are not two sets of manners, one set of manners for the princesses in Buckingham Palace and another set of manners for the Weihsien concentration camp."

When they were marched into the concentration camp they said the first verse of Psalms 46 - God is our refuge, our refuge and our strength. We will not be afraid.

"All of these words just sung into our hearts. That sticks. It's like you've got a groove sticking in the gramophone record. I am safe. I am safe. I am safe. That was just profound."
